1 kV AXQJ is a halogen-free and flame-retardant cable, 0.6/1kV, suitable for open fixed installations both indoors and outdoors, in soil, air, water, and in conduits. It features aluminium sector-shaped cores ranging from 50mm² to 300mm², and a screen of annealed copper wire with counter helix.

Cut-off criteria:

All major raw materials and all the essential energy is included. The production processes for raw materials and energy flows with very small amounts (less than 1%) are not included. These cut-off criteria do not apply for hazardous materials and substances.

Allocation:

The allocation is made in accordance with the provisions of EN 15804. Incoming energy and water and waste production in-house is allocated equally among all products through mass allocation. Effects of primary production of recycled materials is allocated to the main product in which the material was used. The recycling process and transportation of the material is allocated to this analysis.

Data quality:

Specific data for the product composition are provided by the manufacturer. The data represent the production of the declared product and were collected for EPD development in the year of study. Background data is based on EPDs according to EN 15804 and different LCA databases. The data quality of the raw materials in A1 is presented in the table below.



System boundary:

The analysis is a cradle-to-grave study made for 1 m of cable manufactured , installed and used outdoor over the lifetime 40 years. Modules A1-A5 are included in the analysis. It includes the extraction and production of raw materials, transportation to the factory, the production process itself, transportation to market and installation of the product. Modules B1-B7 describe the use phase and are declared for an outdoor cable. B6 is the operational energy usage based on a normal use. C1-C4, D are mandatory modules which include end of life treatment of materials and the benefits from recycling.

The flowchart below illustrates the system boundaries of the analysis:

LCA: Scenarios and additional technical information

The following information describe the scenarios in the different modules of the EPD.

Module A4 = The scenario considered in this EPD is based on true distansces from suppliers.

Modules A5 = 2 % product losses during installation are estimated by the company. No energy use for installation has been quantified since this operation is assumed to be done with other products and should be assessed at a construction works level. Cable drums are reused and assumed under the cut-off criterion of 1%.

For B1-B7 the default environmental impact and resource indicators in the EPD are assumed to be zero. Some other potential environmental impacts from the use phase might not be covered by the scope of an EPD.

Module B6 = The operational energy use of the cable is calculated based on the methodology described in PEP Ecopassport, Product Specific Rules (PSR) for wires, cables

and accessories, reference PSR-0001-ed3-EN-2015 10 16. The following parameters are used to calculate the electricity loss of the cable:

- Estimate service life = 40 years
- Number of conductors = 4 units
- Use rate = 100 percent (according to appendix 1 of the PSR)
- Linear conductor resistivity =0,0006410hm per meter
- Current intensity = 1 Ampere

Module C1 = For both buildings and construction works, cables will be taken out as part of a larger demolition. The energy use for cable removal compared to other heaver materials is assumed to be low. This module can therefore be included with zero impact.

Module C2 = Estamated average of 85km (Scandinavian standard).

Modules C3 and C4 = Waste treatment of the product follows the default values provided in EN 50693, Product Category Rules for life cycle assessments of electronic and electrical products and systems, table G.4. This table specified how different types of raw materials used in A1 will likely be treated during the end-of-life of the product. Waste treatments in C3 include material recycling and incineration with and without energy recovery and fly ash extraction. Disposal in C4 consist of landfilling of different waste fractions and of ashes.

Module D = The recyclability of metals and plastics allows the producers a credit for the net scrap that is produced at the end of a product's life. The benefits from recycling of net scrap are described in formula from EN 15804:2012+A2:2019. Substitution of heat and electricity generated by the incineration with energy recovery of plastic insulation and other parts is also calculated in module D.
